CFHC Celebrates 40 Years Serving Local Communities!

40 years ago--four decades Central Florida Health Care (CFHC), formerly Florida Rural Health Services, Inc., originated in Frostproof, FL. From modest beginning in 1972, CFHC has become part of a state and nationwide health care safety net system. For more than 45 years, health centers have been responsible for bringing physicians and other clinical providers and access to comprehensive primary and preventative health services into the nation's neediest and most isolated communities. Now 40 years later, the mission of CFHC remains strong and steadfast in spite of ever-changing healthcare landscape. Gaye Williams, CEO, stated, "Successes and victories have come from a strong community-based governing Board of Directors that are "fixed" and "united" behind the management team. Going from good to great has been

Aiming For A Healthy Start!



Healthy Start works to ensure that all pregnant women and newborns are screened for risk factors for infant mortality and poor birth outcomes. The Healthy Start Program provides targeted services for eligible women and infants that are unique to our community and tailored those identified risks. In Hardee, Highlands, and Polk counties, Healthy Start served about 6,500 moms and babies last year. Our additional

The overall goal of C.H.O.I.C.E is to increase self-efficacy and general well being by improving participants' knowledge of nutritional choices that focus on heart and bone healthy foods as well as supportive physical activities.

Network Sponsors RN for FRHA Conference

Heartland Rural Health Network sponsored Diana Simon, a Registered Nurse, so she could attend the 19th annual Florida Rural Health Association Conference held programs and initiatives worked to reduce teen pregnancies, link working uninsured pregnant women with insurance and prenatal care, provide safe sleep education and portable cribs to families, and provide evidence-based group prenatal care that increases the chances that newborns will be born at a healthy birth weight.

Healthy Start has contributed to improvements in birth outcomes - Florida's infant mortality rate, while still too high, has declined to its lowest rate of 6.4 per 1,000 live births in 2001. Florida has the lowest infant mortality rate in the southern United States. In our tri-county area, the infant mortality rate was even lower than the state rate at 6.2.

Prematurity, or being born earlier than 37 weeks, is the leading cause of infant death in our community. In Florida in 2011, 28,560 babies were born prematurely in Florida, which is a rate of 13.4. In Hardee, Highlands and Polk counties, 1,073 babies were born prematurely and the rate of prematurity was 12.6. According to the March of Dimes, the average medical costs for a preterm baby are more than 10 times higher than those for a healthy full-term baby. The medical costs for a healthy baby from birth to his first birthday were \$4,551; however, for a preterm baby, the costs were \$49,033.

Research supports Healthy Start's efforts, showing that women who received prenatal care coordination services were found to have significantly better birth outcomes; that the Healthy Start screening process is effective in identifying risks for a low birth weight or preterm infant; and shows that investing in programs for children from before birth to age 5 produces economic benefits and high rates of return.

Last year, Healthy Start received a statewide \$5.4 Million dollar budget cut, which was partially restored this year. In our tri-county area, this cut reduced the number served and the number of services by 7%. Healthy Start seeks to protect Florida's babies and reduce immediate and future costs by fully restoring this budget cut in the upcoming year.

Network Receives Grant To Help Support Drug Free Coalitions' Efforts

The Heartland Rural Health Network, Inc., in collaboration with Drug Free Highlands and the Hardee Alliance for Substance Abuse & Teen Pregnancy Prevention, received a federal Sober Truth on Preventing Underage Drinking (STOP) Act grant from the Substance Abuse & Mental Health Administration. This is a four year grant totaling \$193,032. The STOP ACT grant program provides funding for community-based coalitions throughout the country to prevent and reduce alcohol use among youth ages 12-20. The program strengthens collaboration among communities, as well as federal, state, local and tribal governments in efforts to instill an active commitment to prevent underage drinking.

Celebrating Sweet Success!

Locally, these two coalitions are teaming up to reduce underage drinking by using four environmental strategies. Youth in Hardee and Highlands Counties will have an opportunity to participate in an exciting social media campaign that uses texts to deliver educational messages on underage drinking and alcohol. Project Success, an evidence based program for youth, will be available in cooperation with several community agencies.

The grant will also help support quarterly compliance checks of alcohol in collaboration with local law enforcement. The Primary Retail Education Program (PREP) will also be made available to local merchants that sell and/or serve alcohol to educate them on methods to reduce underage alcohol sales.



The Hardee and Highlands Coalitions are comprised of community leaders, parents, youth, teachers, religious and fraternal organizations, health care and business professionals, law enforcement, and the media who work together to address substance use within their respective counties. The coalitions also work together on a variety of projects to maximize resources.

"We are truly excited about the opportunity to partner with Drug Free Highlands and Hardee ASAPP to reduce alcohol use among youth in these two counties," said Kelly J. Johnson, Heartland Rural Health Network's Executive Director. Jacqueline Rawlings, Drug Free Highlands Coalition Chair stated, "We are thrilled with the news of this grant award. We now have an opportunity to expand the two coalitions' efforts to reduce substance use among youth in our rural communities by having additional resources that are designed to specifically address on underage drinking."


The statewide implementation of managed care dental plans for children's services took effect on October 1, 2012 in most of central Florida, including Highlands County. The two dental plans that have contracted with the state are MCNA and DentaQuest. Highlands County DOH is

working with DentaQuest to continue to provide the finest dental care for our patients. We will provide the same services and level of care that we have in the past, including x-rays and exams, cleanings, fluoride treatments, sealant, fillings and extractions. Parents and guardians wishing to continue to use Children's Dental Care of Highlands for their child's dentistry need to be sure they are enrolled with DentaQuest.
